

*Taking the Good News of Jesus into our lives and into God's World*  
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If I were to ask you about one story in the Bible - well-known by children and adults alike - which would it be? I'm guessing that many of you would say Noah's Ark. We find the story of Noah and the flood in Genesis chapters 6-9 and most of us know it well.

A quick précis: God saw the wickedness of man and wanted to destroy the earth - Genesis 6:6: "The Lord regretted that he had made human beings on the earth and his heart was deeply troubled." But God had seen Noah's faithfulness. He gave Noah instructions to build a boat, to save his family and two of each kind of animal. The rains and the floods came, everything was destroyed. The floods receded and Noah and everyone on the Ark was safe. God blessed Noah and his family and put a rainbow in the sky as a promise to never destroy the earth in a flood again.

So God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant I have established between me and all life on the earth." (Genesis 9:17)

But let's go back to the beginning of that story for a moment, to Genesis 6, when God gives Noah instructions on how to build the boat. You can imagine Noah sitting over the architectural drawings with a pencil tucked behind his ear and a tape measure round his neck. God gave precise dimensions, the type of wood to use, instructions on how to keep it water-tight, how many levels it should have, how to build the roof and where to put the doors. Noah, in his faithfulness, built it exactly to God's instructions - Genesis 6:22. He got all the animals and his family on board and then God shut them in - Genesis 7:16.

With the rains pouring all around them, with the cacophony of noise that there must have been, in the weariness of all his work, I wonder what Noah thought as God closed that door? Because for all the detail in God's plans for that boat, which Noah followed precisely, one crucial element was missing - how would they steer? There was no steering wheel or rudder, no sail, and certainly no engine. He would have no way to avoid trees, rocks or mountains as the waters rose. He couldn't turn into the waves to stop the boat tipping over. But this boat wasn't designed to be steered by human hands. It was designed to be a vessel of salvation, commanded by holy hands.

When our lives feel like we are in choppy waters, when we are facing the storms that come our way, how often do we feel as though we are out of control? We may be desperately trying to steer our lives in one direction only to feel it all pushed the opposite way. These are the times that we need to follow Noah's lead. Let go of trying to steer your own ship and trust God. God is our Captain. He knows our route. He knows our destination. He will get us there safely.

As we move through Lent and look towards Easter, we are again reminded of Jesus's trials in the wilderness, his crucifixion and resurrection. As we reflect on God's salvation plan for each of us I pray that, as you face life's trials, you will put your trust in our Saviour Jesus, and choose to appoint him captain of your life.

There will be an election to fill vacancies for church officers and deacons at the Church Meeting on **Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> March**, after the morning service.

*[Please note – this is a change to the originally advertised day and date].*

Nominations for these vacancies opened on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> February and will close on **Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> March**. Profiles of those nominated will be displayed on church noticeboards as soon after that as possible.

Since we do not currently have a church secretary, please contact Nigel, Alastair, Barbara or Nic to obtain a nomination form, to return completed forms or to ask any questions etc. about the role. Any nomination form returned by post MUST be received in the church office by Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> March.

There will be three Officer vacancies:-

- Treasurer: Barbara Williams is eligible to be re-elected if nominated and wishes to stand.



Thur 12<sup>th</sup> Pray for the important work being done at Archbishop Courtenay School and the outreach program involved there.




Fri 13<sup>th</sup> Pray for our government under Sir Kier Starmer as he leads the country through this turbulent time negotiating with world leaders from East to West.

## **CLEANING STREETS AND CHANGING HEARTS IN SOUTH SUDAN**

*How a women-owned waste management business is transforming throw-away culture into long-lasting change in Juba.*

Beyond the well-known challenges of conflict and poverty in South Sudan, a quieter emergency is growing: environmental damage and pollution.

**Meet Alice Sabuni** CEO of EcoClean

*\*First African woman to win the Nobel Peace Prize in 2004 for her work as a political and environmental activist.*

With funding from Tearfund, she started EcoClean, a women-owned waste management company focused on improving health and livelihoods through sustainable recycling. In Juba, South Sudan, EcoClean is creating radical change by cleaning up the streets, giving informal waste pickers dignified employment, and working to change people's mindsets on environmental issues.

If you met Alice, you would immediately sense her determination to care for God's creation. Her passion is contagious. But that wasn't always the case...

Born in Juba, South Sudan, Alice fled with her family during the civil war. She grew up in refugee camps in Uganda, and later moved to the US as a teenager. 'In my second year at medical school, I met Dr Wangarĩ

Maathai\*,’ says Alice. ‘She talked about the environment, and this is where it all ignited for me. I came home and said, ‘I’m changing my degree to environmental science.’”

When Alice returned to Juba, she saw the issues of pollution, poor waste management, and tree cutting, and felt compelled to do something about it. ‘If I don’t do it, who will?’, Alice said. ‘There’s not a lot of people working in the environmental sectors, and I really want to see an impact. And that’s how EcoClean got birthed.’

### **The rubbish problem in South Sudan**

With no official bodies to manage medical waste or recycling, most rubbish is openly dumped, creating major risks to health and the environment.

‘We’re a single-use country,’ explains Alice. ‘Five to six million water bottles are created every day, and they’re not going anywhere. We’re at the source of the river, and the waste goes straight there. There’s no recycling facility.’

Because South Sudan is facing extreme poverty and multiple crises, environmental issues are often overlooked by the government and its people.

‘Somebody will be drinking water in their car and just throw the empty bottle out the window,’ Alice explains. ‘Or they’ll be walking along and throwing their rubbish on the ground. So there’s a lot of awareness that needs to happen.’

Tearfund shares in Alice’s belief that in South Sudan, and around the world, we must address environmental issues alongside other challenges, to avoid them becoming an even greater problem down the line.

‘We see the impact very slowly,’ says Alice. But the signs of progress along the way encourage EcoClean and its employees to keep going. ‘When I look at Juba, I feel like the streets are cleaner. Women know how to clean!’ she laughs. ‘But I would really advocate for more women to run waste management companies.’

## **From throw-away culture to long-lasting change**

EcoClean is committed to creating lasting environmental and social change in South Sudan in a number of ways:

- **Recycling** – Setting up the country’s first plastic recycling plant and medical waste treatment and disposal sites.
- **Innovation** – Kickstarting a farming project that involves rearing flies to convert organic waste into low-cost, sustainable animal feed.
- **Sustainability** – Manufacturing eco-friendly products such as plastic lumber, boats, and construction materials.
- **Business** – Starting a plastic Buy Centre, run by women and youth, to collect plastic for recycling and selling.
- **Giving back to the community** – Paying school fees for around 300 local students each year and regularly distributing food to community members in need.
- **Empowering women** – Creating more jobs and income for women, by hiring 65 per cent women for future plastic-sorting projects.

Alice adds, ‘right now, we’re also working with Tearfund to support informal waste pickers and help them earn a living. Usually what they earn is very small, and the conditions are horrific. But because we are a business, we can pay them a fair wage and show them dignity and respect for the work they’re doing.’

**Pray for South Sudan**

- Pray for the hearts and minds of people in South Sudan to change – especially for lawmakers and those in positions of power, that they would start to see environmental issues as an urgent priority.
- Pray for better legislation to make clean streets the norm in South Sudan.
- Pray for Alice, her colleagues, and their ongoing work at EcoClean, as they aim to hire more women and send more children to school.

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**WORLD WATCH LIST #1 –  
NORTH KOREA**



**Messages from secret believers in North Korea**

When the latest World Watch List was released earlier this month, it wasn't a surprise to see North Korea again topping it. Life for North Korea's secret believers remains extremely dangerous and it's made harder by a devastating humanitarian crisis that continues to affect the wider population – one that is largely ignored by the regime as it seeks to strengthen its self-reliance as well as its strategic position on the world stage.

## **Cold, dark streets**

“The economic situation of North Korean residents is truly dire,” says a believer. “The streets are dark, and the citizens are suffering greatly in hunger. The government’s constant emphasis on self-reliance as the only way to survive makes North Koreans feel utterly hopeless about their future.”

Another secret believer shares, “The newspapers and television loudly proclaim that new factories and workplaces provided by the government are producing goods necessary for the people’s daily lives. However, in reality, many factories are not operating.”

Other messages emphasise the poor health conditions. North Korea is deep in its winter season (December to March), January being the coldest month with temperatures that can reach as low as ten degrees Fahrenheit (-23 degrees Celsius).

“Recently, there was a large temperature difference between day and night, which caused widespread flu and respiratory infectious disease,” one believer explains. “Especially those who are aged or young can catch flu more easily as their immune system becomes weak. Here, it is a great problem to catch a cold because medicines sold in markets are not only very expensive but also are in very small quantities.”

Once again, the façade of life in North Korea versus the reality creates resentment and confusion. “In a pharmacy, you only see what is displayed, but no actual medicines are available for sale,” another message reveals. “As a result, people endure the illness without proper treatment, or rely on folk remedies, such as boiling radish and ginger with sugar sprinkled on top, or adding sugar to

ginger juice and mixing it into hot water as a substitute for medicine.”

## **Flourishing faith**

And yet, seemingly against all impossibility, faith in Jesus continues to flourish. Like most of the messages that Open Doors receives from secret believers, words of scripture, gratitude and praise reveal a church with a deep faith and resolve to cling to the gospel. “With an unchanging and steadfast faith in the Lord, we have come to deeply realise that we must never abandon our faith in Christ,” says a believer. “Even if it costs us our life. We have to stand firm for the truth of God’s Word.”

Another message refers to God’s promises in Isaiah 43:2-3: “When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned; the flames will not set you ablaze.” The believer adds, “We give thanks and praise to Him who has granted us hope in this autumn after the heavy rains and intense heat of summer, who has kept us as the apple of His eye, and who is ever with us through His abiding presence, Immanuel.”



It’s through faithful support and prayers that God’s presence is so often felt. “Your unimaginable warmth and thoughtful actions have touched our lives profoundly, permeating every corner of our daily existence and flowing into us like air, becoming an inexhaustible source of strength,” says a believer. “We still exist thanks to your prayers and support,” says another believer.

## **Please pray**

## **WORLD WATCH LIST #3 – YEMEN**

Christians in Yemen are facing an unprecedented crackdown, with more than 50 believers detained since the beginning of the year. “Most of the people that I was always in contact with are now imprisoned,” shares an Open Doors partner.

Majed\* is acutely aware that he could also be taken – and that’s why he’s preparing for it. “I’m trying to memorise as many Bible passages and verses as possible. I want to be a walking Bible, so that wherever I’m taken, I can share about Jesus,” he says.

“Yemen needs light; it has been living in darkness for decades,” he adds. “Pray that change may happen. Pray that what is happening now will open the eyes of my dearly beloved Yemenis. May they realise that there are Christians in Yemen who believe in Jesus. May our struggles push them to believe in Him.”

### **How are Christians persecuted in Yemen?**

- Christians in Yemen continue to endure a highly unstable condition of life, with threats from both authorities and family. Believers whose faith is discovered by their family could be forced into divorce or separated from their children.
- Converts from Islam could face the death penalty for apostasy, creating an environment in which many feel forced to keep their faith secret.
- Islamist extremist groups attack Christian communities, meaning that if those who gather in secret are discovered, they face grave consequences.

## **Why are Christians persecuted in Yemen?**

- ❖ The general state of insecurity and humanitarian crisis in Yemen leaves Christians especially vulnerable – emergency aid is usually distributed through mosques to local Muslims, who may discriminate against those who are not devout Muslims.
- ❖ The rule of law is generally weak across Yemen, increasing the dangers encroaching on believers.
- ❖ Non-Islamic faith groups cannot register with the authorities, nor can their places of worship. Many are ransacked or destroyed.

## **Who is particularly vulnerable in Yemen?**

- In the south, fractured governance and Islamist extremist groups pose continuous threats to Christians. In the Houthis-controlled north western regions, pressures are particularly severe – these areas are heavily policed, dissent is brutally repressed, and Christian converts who are discovered could face arrest and torture.
- Christian women experience increased harsh treatment if their faith is exposed, including abuse, forced marriage and even so-called ‘honour’ killings, as Yemen’s penal code grants leniency to perpetrators. Many feel spiritually isolated because of the repression they endure and their frequent inability to enjoy fellowship with others.
- In the war-torn environment of Yemen, Christian men could be forcibly recruited into militias, some even as young as 13. If discovered, converts from Islam could lose their job, be imprisoned or even killed. Once taken from their families, their homes are especially vulnerable financially. Many Christian men choose to flee the country.

## **What has changed in Yemen in the past year?**

- The experience of believers in Yemen remains much the same and 2025 has seen several harsh attacks against believers – as one Christian leader explains, “Not a single year has passed without a major incident – each time the church is left shaken and gripped by fear.
- An extremist-backed media campaign targeted Christian leaders, inducing increased hostility towards Christians and risks to their lives. It has also meant that many believers have ceased meeting together because of the pressures, and some have fled the country. Zahra\* says, “The fact that we still meet is a miracle. I do not deny that I am sometimes afraid. I still say, I might leave the house one day and not come back – not only me, but also my brothers and sisters.”
- Nevertheless, God continues to build His church in Yemen – there are signs of steady growth in numbers of believers and faith, largely owing to the persevering witness of their loved ones.
